Friends Welcome You Home to Five Rivers

We were so happy to be back in full swing at Five Rivers, after the Visitor Center reopened to the public in June 2021. After an extremely trying time for all during the difficult pandemic, Friends of Five Rivers chose the theme of “Connection through Nature” to carry us through 2022 as it reminded the public of the importance of connecting through nature to heal and bring us back together as a thriving community. It was wonderful to also connect with so many of you in-person throughout the past year. The 2022 year was indeed a great one for our Friends group.

Friends’ volunteer Greeters returned. Guided School program instructors returned and training resumed. We thanked our volunteers at an outdoor evening event, with food, bonfire, and shared entertainment.

A new Development Director started in December 2021. Paulette worked with a very active Development Committee implementing new events and activities that were carried out for our 50th Anniversary year. Our website has seen many improvements and additions. Our Gift Shop has been revamped and outreach has been increased. We also added a bookkeeper starting in Fall 2021. Additionally, our scholarship program widened in Spring 2022, as we granted two high school students scholarships to pursue their education. We then hired a new part-time educator in late summer 2022, and finally, our Board had some face-to-face meetings and brought in some fresh faces to serve.

While our Education programs for youth and adults were adapted during the pandemic, they came back to full capacity in Spring 2022. Students and adults enthusiastically returned in-person for educational programs as instructors renewed their commitments to guiding school groups in science-based curricula.

Friends of Five Rivers celebrated 50 years in partnership with NYS Department of Environmental Conservation. Many of our members and friends came to the event in June 2022 to celebrate with us, as we began a year of showcasing this partnership. There was record attendance at the 2022 Fall Festival.

Our members, who continue to support our programs, make what we do possible. It is important to continue to tell who we are, what we do, and how much that support is needed.

Financial Report

2021-2022 Fiscal Year: Stable Financial Picture

The Friends' Financial Reports, including the IRS 2020 Return (Form 990) and the NYS Annual Financial Report for Charitable Organizations (CHAR500), prepared by an independent accountant, are available to the public. The following is a summary of the Friends' financial performance for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2022.

OVERALL PICTURE

Operational revenue decreased and spending increased compared to the previous fiscal year but revenue still outpaced expenses by \$1,682. Overall, total revenue as reported in the IRS 990 decreased from the prior year by \$359 to \$180,365, while total spending increased by \$16,705 to \$178,683.

BREAKDOWN OF OPERATING REVENUE

The largest sources of operating revenue came from government grants of \$83,373 (46%). It was followed by non-government grants and contributions (including fundraising) of \$59,401 (33%), membership dues of \$16,127 (9%), program fees of \$16,084 (9%) and gift shop sales and other ancillary sources of \$5,380 (3%).

BREAKDOWN OF SPENDING

Program expenses of \$115,389 accounting for 65% of total spending, was the largest area of spending and a \$14,711 increase from the prior year. Fundraising expenses at 24% accounted for the second largest area of spending at \$43,191, an increase over the \$34,899 (21%) spent on fund raising in the previous year. Management and administration of \$20,103 accounted for the remaining spending at 11%.

END OF YEAR ACCOUNT BALANCES

Cash account balances on June 30, 2022, totaled \$199,417 compared to \$215,816 at the beginning of the year. Of the total assets, \$107,588 was restricted to a specific purpose either by the donor or by Board action and \$172,360 was unrestricted. Total net assets for the year decreased to \$279,948 from \$280,444 in the prior year.



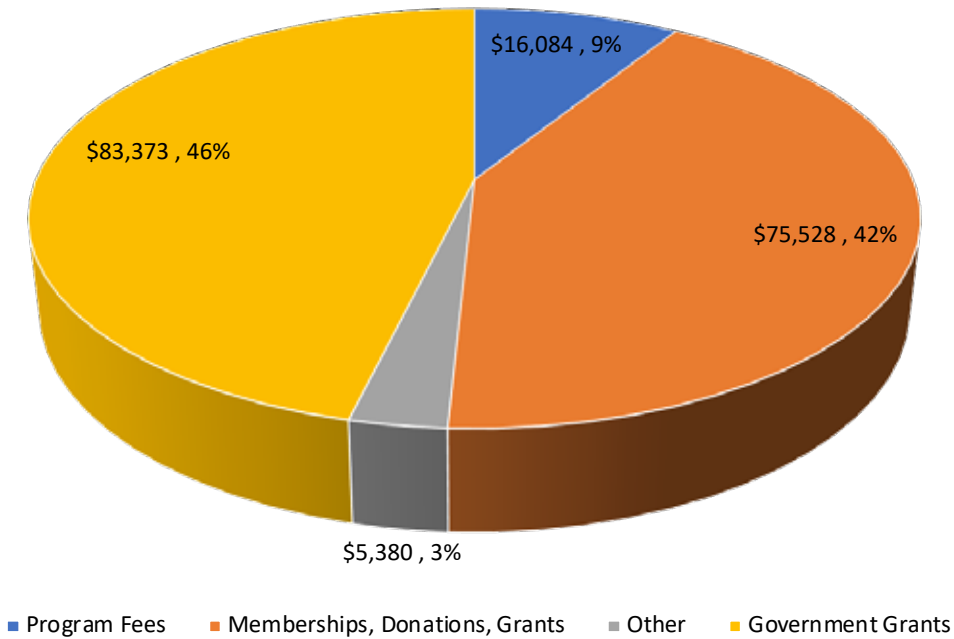

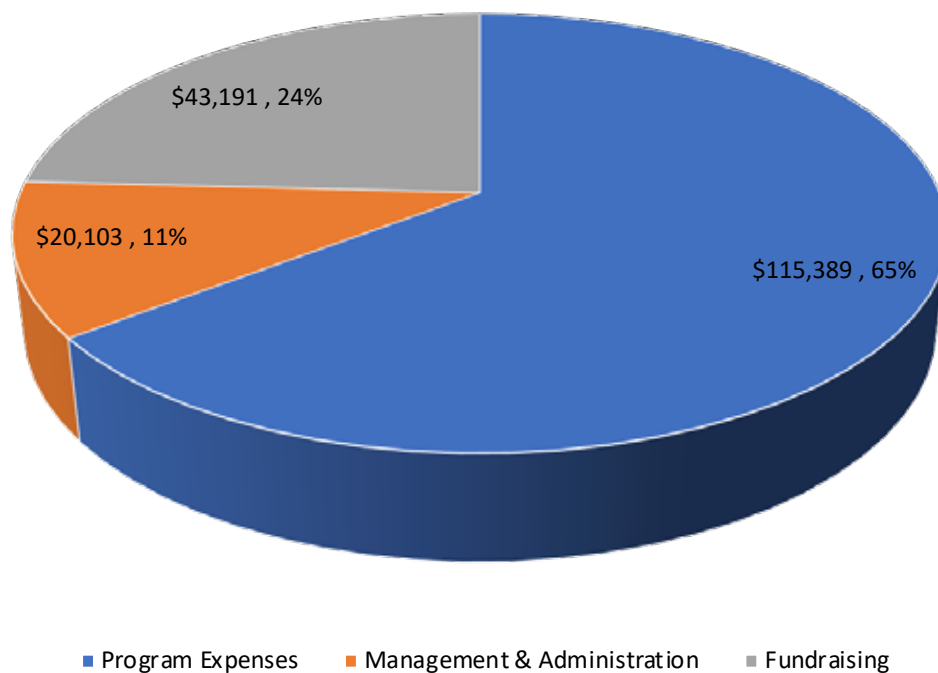

Guided School Programs Back in Full Glory

The 2021-22 school year started off slowly with only three schools bravely touching their toes back into field trip waters. Like bees to the blossom, students took to the stream, fields, and ponds. Their need for the outdoors and a care-free childhood was almost too much to contain. And we adults let out the collective breath we had been holding for nearly two years, grateful for Five Rivers and the simple normalcy of being together.

Winter, however, brought fear back into the picture. A spike in illness locally resulted in only a few schools visiting for Marvelous Maples and Advanced Maples. By spring the spike had subsided, and buses were arriving daily. In a span of six weeks, 275 students participated in Birds lessons, 263 in Stream Life lessons, 222 in Animal Signs lessons, and 231 in World of Pond lessons. If not for the constant use of hand sanitizer, it might have felt as if the pandemic had never occurred. But it had. And remembering keeps our sense of gratitude alive.

Friends is grateful to the brave teachers who scheduled visits for their 1,441 students in 2021-22. We are grateful for our talented volunteer instructors who worked harder than ever to channel students’ enthusiasm into learning opportunities in the field. And we are grateful to have Friends like you who saw us through the storm, believing environmental education and the development of tomorrow’s stewards are worth contributing to.

2021-2022 EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMMING HIGHLIGHTS

Friends offered Guided School Program (GSP) lessons for the first time since March 2020. A total of 219 adult chaperones accompanied the 1,441 students who visited for a wide range of lessons. Volunteer instructors, DEC staff and Friends educators celebrated being back “in business”!

The pandemic offered Friends time to fulfill special programming requests from community groups. Such programs were developed and provided to Bethlehem Seniors, MVP Health Care Providers, Community Care Givers, and U.S. Committee for Refugees and Immigrants (USCRI). Time was also used to recognize Friends volunteers and members with free guided nature walks. A total of 117 people took part in these special programs and walks.

Friends continued to offer additional programming for individuals and families. Programs such as Talk and Trek, Snow Snakes, Introduction to Honey Bees, and Mapling at Home were delivered in small group settings. A total of 79 adults and children took part in these programs.

LOOKING FORWARD TO THE 2022-2023 SCHOOL YEAR

The future looks bright! During Fall 2022, 307 students accompanied by 99 adult chaperones took part in Guided School Programs, a 33% increase over Fall 2021. This trend increases to 37% when including the 1,885 students scheduled to visit for Maples and Spring programs this year.

Additional programming is projected to outpace last year as well. Talk and Trek, Introduction to Honey Bees, and Snow Snakes were attended by 22 people this fall, and 45 people have registered for programs occurring this winter. And Spring 2023 programming has not even been released yet!

Family Fun Programs Turn Beautiful!

When the Family Fun Summer Programs were created in the 1980s, the name emphasized the fact that family members would work together. The name was used for all programs that targeted families.

In 2010, the program coordinator transferred from DEC educator to Friends educator, and continued the Family Fun title; as did the Center for their programs. Both entities had a different format. By 2021, Friends realized the confusion this was causing and changed our programs to a different title.

At the beginning of each of the Friends family programs, the participants greet the day by observing our surroundings and declaring it to be 'A Beautiful Day'. We had our new program title!

SUMMER BEAUTIFUL DAY - July /August 2021

In 2021, with Covid restrictions being cut back, we increased families per naturalist from three to four.

The Summer Program ran for three weeks, Monday through Friday (two weeks in July and one week in August). We added Mondays as a day to create their journals so that journal making would not detract from the environmental activities that started on Tuesdays. This worked out very well, especially when we added an animal focused Obstacle Course to be enjoyed after Journal making was done. Lots of fun! Each family attended for one week.

- Participants: 26 families, including 37 adults and 44 children.

FALL BEAUTIFUL DAY - September through December 2021

With Covid restrictions lifting and schools coming back for Guided School Program (GSP) lessons, Beautiful Day was cut back to November and December, so the program coordinator could teach for GSP in September and October.

The program went back to an indoor and outdoor format and ran 90 minutes each day (1hr in 2020). Each family attended one day/week for three weeks.

- November participants: 8 families, including 9 adults and 11 children.
- December participants: 9 families, including 10 adults and 11 children.

Beautiful Day Family Programming Report continued



WINTER BEAUTIFUL DAY - January/February 2022

With schools returning for Maple Sugaring classes, March Beautiful Day was dropped so the coordinator could teach for GSP. Each family attended one day/week for three weeks.

- January participants: 10 families, including 11 adults and 13 children.
- February participants: 12 families, including 13 adults and 13 children.

SPRING BEAUTIFUL DAY - April/May 2022

Since there were open days that had been reserved for school programming, it was decided to put in two single day Beautiful Day programs for preschoolers. Each program had a Tuesday and Wednesday session. Each family attended one day.

- April participants: 9 families, including 9 adults and 11 children.
- May participants: 7 families, including 7 adults and 7 children.

SUMMER BEAUTIFUL DAY - July/August 2022

Although we kept the families to Naturalist ratio at four to one, our numbers were higher than last year.

We reached full capacity each week, and even had a waiting list; first time since pre-Covid. There were more younger children. Parents were clearly more comfortable that Covid was no longer the threat it had been. The Naturalists did have masks if adults indicated they wanted us to wear them. We did not allow the sharing of materials and continued to use hand sanitizer liberally. We still sanitized anything the children touched, at the end of the day.

We kept the five days a week schedule and the Obstacle Course on Mondays after Journal making. The program ran for three weeks and each family attended for one week.

- Participants: 36 families, including 47 adults and 53 children.

WINTER BEAUTIFUL DAY - November/December 2022

We felt comfortable increasing the family to Naturalist ratio to five to one. Both months were short of capacity. Each family attended one day/week for three weeks

- November participants: 7 families, including 8 adults and 11 children.
- December participants: 9 families, including 11 adults and 11 children.

Bookstore Transitions to Gift Shop for Wider Appeal with More Merchandise



"Friends' Bookstore" is now referred to as "Friends' Gift Shop" since many other items besides books are available. Last year, we offered a variety of new items including shirts and mugs commemorating our 50th anniversary, photo cards, holiday ornaments, stuffed owls, candles, colored pencils – a little something for everyone! Photo cards, ornaments, magnets, key chains, and pins were made using photographs taken by local photographers of the wildlife and landscapes found at Five Rivers. These items were a big hit since customers felt like they were able to take a little piece of Five Rivers home with them.

In addition to enhancing the Friends' Gift Shop located within the Center, Friends expanded public awareness of our Center and of the items sold in the Gift Shop by setting up a table at the Delmar Farmers Market held on Saturdays from May to December. This resulted in increased Gift Shop sales, but more importantly resulted in increased public awareness of Friends' mission, programs, events, membership, and volunteer opportunities. Educational materials were brought from the Center (e.g., beaver skull, snake skins) and made available to curious visitors who stopped by our table. This provided an educational experience for families and proved to be a big hit with both children and adults!



Promotion of Five Rivers merchandise through social media and participation at the Delmar Farmers Market helped raise awareness of our Gift Shop. These efforts helped create demand for our merchandise. For example, people started calling the Center to ask that items be placed on hold and visited the Center specifically to purchase promoted items. We have even received calls from vendors inquiring if we were interested in selling their merchandise. Through expanded marketing initiatives and increased efforts of volunteers, the Gift Shop sales increased again in 2022! As always, the proceeds continue to support our environmental education programs.

The Friends' Gift Shop now offers credit card payment on a limited basis. This was initiated at the Fall Festival and was very popular! It is now offered at other special events held at the Center, as well as at the Delmar Farmers Market.

When visiting Five Rivers, it's well worth the time to go into the Center to view the educational displays, visit Argo our resident barred owl, or browse the merchandise at the Gift Shop. We offer apparel, books, unique gifts and educational materials. The Center is staffed by volunteer greeters who will be happy to help and answer any questions.

Connection through Nature Carried Us Through 50th Anniversary Year

This past year was an exciting one as we opened our doors again to events and activities, just in time for our 50th Anniversary year.

The theme that carried us throughout the 2021 into the 2022 anniversary year was “Connection through Nature.” It was being in the space and presence of nature that helped many people through the long, difficult pandemic, thus the theme that culminated 50 years was most appropriate. Great enthusiasm ushered back our traditional and new programs, events, and activities at Five Rivers.

In addition to assisting the NYS Department of Environmental Conservation staff at Five Rivers with “I Love My Parks Day” in May, and the “Get Outdoors and Get Together Day” in June, we also organized our own very successful “Creative Nature Expressions” artistic exhibits around photography, quilting/needlework, poetry, mixed media, and children’s art. The monthly exhibits were accompanied with an educational component or showcase. We held August Art days with two local professional artists. Then in September, the 2022 Fall Festival was a record-breaking success held over the course of six hours on the grounds of our beautiful facility. Friends of Five Rivers played a vital role in organizing this community event alongside our Five Rivers staff and interns. It was an amazing team effort! We rounded out the year of in-person activities with our Fall Birdseed Sale and then our annual Volunteer Appreciation event.



The Development & Communications Committee also rose to the challenge of finding creative giving opportunities for people to contribute while leaving their mark at Five Rivers within the parameters of the Department of Environmental Conservation. A “Giving Tree” was installed in the vestibule between the Five Rivers Visitor Center and the Guided School Program building. Painted by local artist, Carol Coogan, this beautiful tree will hold up to 200 plus wooden leaves of various sizes that may be purchased in honor of a friend or family member for a variety of occasions. The committee is working to launch more giving opportunities in the near future, including an in-memoriam project to honor loved ones lost.

We also worked to elevate the overall awareness of Friends of Five Rivers in the community by participating in tabling events, and increasing our social media presence.

As we move forward into another 50 years of providing support to environmental education and land preservation, we thank you for YOUR ongoing support, understanding, enthusiasm, and encouragement.
